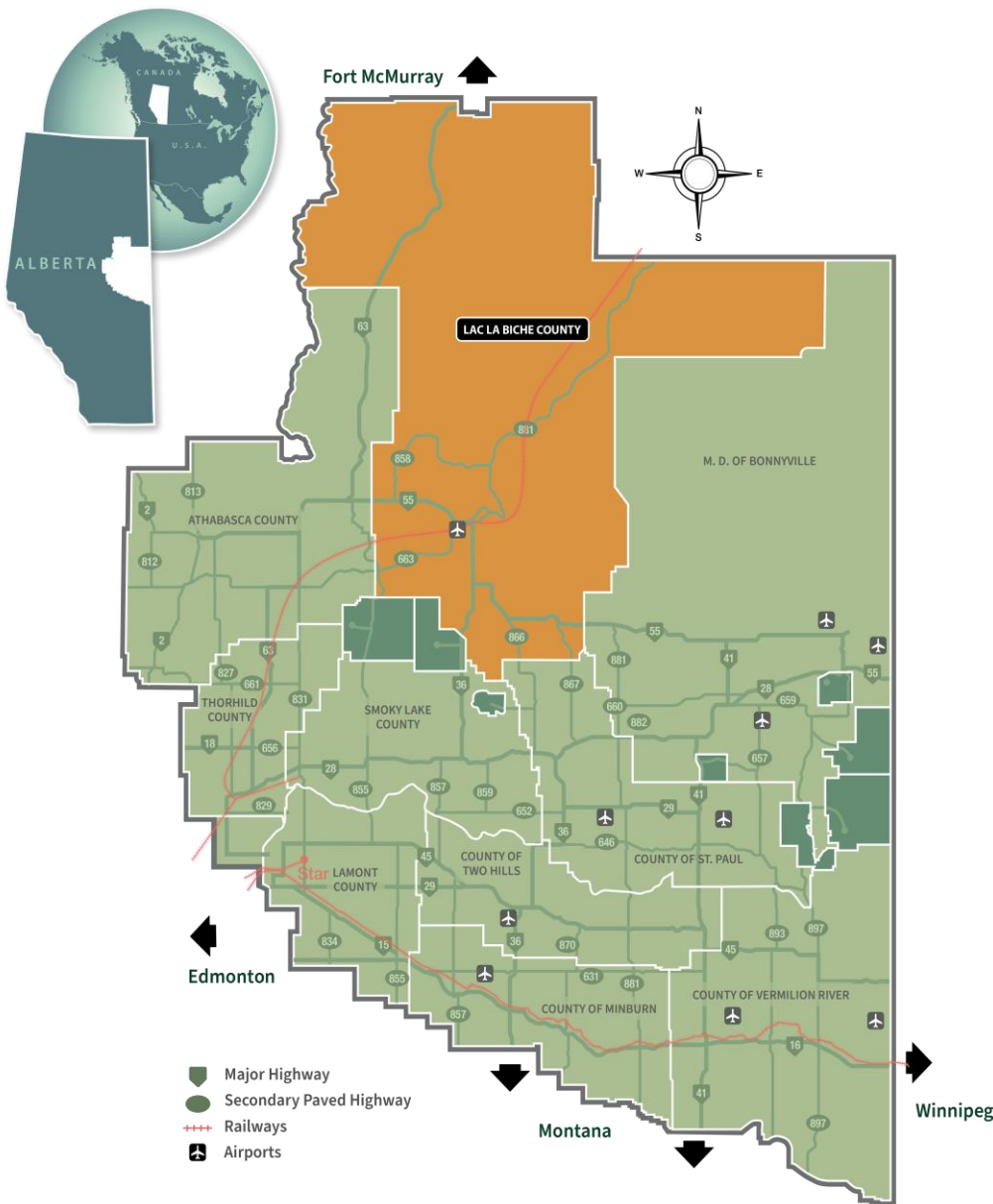


Lac La Biche County

CONNECTED TO GLOBAL MARKETS



Lac La Biche County benefits from vast agricultural resources including low-cost grazing lands and flat crop lands in the southern region of the county. Agriculture in the County has seen moderate growth since 2016 seeing increases in the amount of acres of wheat, canola, barley and all other tame hay and fodder crops. Sheep and Lambs saw a 144% increase hitting a total of over 1,475 in 2021.

The Lac La Biche region has the “Northern Advantage” for growing Industrial Hemp for seed and fibre. The global market demand for Hemp fibre is trending up and with the longer days in late spring and early summer the same hemp variety can grow much taller plants and produce 20-30% higher yields of stalks than in southern regions.

Lac La Biche County is a logistics hub that serves all industries. The County is served by Highways 36, 55, 63, and 881 which reach provincial, national, and international markets. The regional airport has an all-weather 1,765 m paved, lighted runway, fixed wing aircraft and helicopter charter. CN provides rail transport through Lac La Biche County, which offers opportunities for rail-spurs.

Highway 36 is the high load corridor defined as the Eastern Alberta Trade Corridor, connecting to U.S. and Mexican markets.

Lac La Biche County has 247 farms with over 101,000 acres in crop land with gross farm receipts estimated at approximately \$35 million in 2021, a 9.97% increase from 2016.

The County experienced the largest increases in All other tame hay and fodder crops (acres) and Sheep and Lambs (number) at 45% and 144%, respectively.
